At Firelands Electric Cooperative, we are governed by a board of nine trustees. Elected by the membership, these trustees are also co-op members, just like you, who provide strategic guidance to ensure that Firelands continues to serve the best interests of all memberowners. As you consider whom to cast your ballot for in the current election of those representing districts 1, 3, and 6, let's take a moment to reflect on the importance of voting and the role of a Firelands trustee.

As a member of Firelands Electric, you have the right — some may even say the obligation — to help set the direction for the co-op by voting in Firelands' annual trustee elections. Unlike customers of investor-owned utilities, you have a direct say in who represents your interests on the board and in how your cooperative does business. The trustees you elect are then responsible for making decisions regarding the operation of the co-op that best reflect the needs of their fellow members.

Examples of these decisions include:

- Approving the annual budget for the co-op.
- Determining the cooperative's rate schedules and fees.
- Examining and approving major work plans for ongoing maintenance and improvement of the cooperative's distribution system.
- Monitoring the financial condition of the cooperative.
- Establishing policies.

The board of trustees is also charged with providing solutions that maintain the vibrancy of our local communities. Being a co-op board member requires a significant commitment of time and effort and those selected should want to make a substantial contribution to the membership and the community.

It is critically important that we hear your voice and the voices of a large and diverse group of members. Through active engagement and participation of the membership in the election process, the co-op can ensure it is leading in a direction that is right for both the members and the co-op.

At Firelands, we try to make it as convenient as possible for members to participate in the election process by offering both mail-in and electronic ballots. In early May, every member received a paper ballot, which can be returned in the postage-paid envelope provided. If you've misplaced your ballot, or prefer an electronic option, you can also securely cast your vote online by visiting https://firelandsec.coopballot.com.

Ballots must be received by Firelands' independent service provider by 11:59 p.m. on June 18.

As a locally owned organization, Firelands Electric has the opportunity to rekindle the spirit of democracy at the grassroots level. We encourage discussion about the role we see our co-op playing in our homes, businesses, and community — and we urge you to vote and make your voice heard!



Firelands Electric is pleased to announce that 2022 was another successful year for your cooperative. Thanks to the diligent efforts of management and employees, we finished the year with strong margins. These margins are being allocated and \$1 million in general retirement will

be returned to members' capital credits accounts in August, which is equivalent to the amount retired the previous year. Since 1948, Firelands Electric has returned nearly \$20 million in capital credits back to its membership - which is one of the many benefits of a not-for-profit electric cooperative.

Your cooperative's board of trustees, management, and employees are striving to keep the company's controllable costs at the lowest levels possible, while continuing to maintain and improve our distribution system to ensure safe, reliable, and affordable power.

Significant increases in the cost of doing business over the past three years have been a challenge, especially with the rate of inflation and rising material costs. This resulted in a necessary rate adjustment to the monthly distribution charge and kilowatt-hour (kWh) charge that was reflected on the January 2023 bill. Rest assured, Firelands Electric will continue to make every effort to keep rising costs from further affecting our members.

Firelands' rates remain very competitive with other area suppliers and electricity remains a truly outstanding value, especially when you consider everything it does for us every minute of the day.

Each day, the cooperative strives to do everything possible to keep the lights on to ensure the safety and security of everyone in our community. Firelands has also established a long-range work plan that extends out to 2045, which will further strengthen our distribution grid and address substation upgrades. These improvements will help to meet growing power loads and kilowatthour demand - BUILDING A STRONG LEGACY FOR A POWERFUL TOMORROW.

Enhancing reliability continues to be a primary goal for Firelands Electric Cooperative. Management and crews are actively working on the cooperative's current construction work plan, which extends through 2025 and entails nearly \$12 million in improvements, with more than a million dollars dedicated to prioritizing lines with the highest incidents of outages. Increasing capacity and resilience of substation interconnection tie-lines is a priority in keeping our service steadfast.

FOCUSED ON reliability

Firelands Electric and its employees are local, accountable, and committed. We are accessible to our consumer-owners around the clock and use people to communicate. The cooperative values personal contacts and relationships with members, and all of our employees strive to provide immediate response to outages.

From linemen and operation crews working in the field to office personnel advising members on the efficient use of technology or assisting those experiencing financial hardship or reduction of income, every employee is dedicated to serving our members.

A major component of Firelands' commitment to reliability is the cooperative's right-of-way maintenance program. In 2022, this included 238.5 miles of brush-hogging, trimming, and necessary tree removals at a cost of more than \$860,000. Much of this work was completed throughout portions of Green Township in Ashland County; Hartland Township in Huron County; and Mifflin and Monroe townships in Richland County.

The cooperative's right-of way maintenance program has traditionally been on a 4-year rotation. With a goal of 331 miles of regular right-of-way maintenance in 2023, Firelands plans to move toward a 3-year rotation in certain areas of the cooperative's service territory.

In 2022, the cooperative completed multiple line rebuild projects to replace aging conductors, poles, and equipment to better serve increased load capacity. More than 3,000 utility poles were inspected in Ashland, Huron, and Richland counties — followed by the replacement of any deficient poles.



COOPERATIVE UPDATE

BOARD MEETING highlights

Firelands Electric Cooperative's Board of Trustees met *March 28 and covered the following items:*

- Board President Dan Schloemer reported that the cooperative received 25 membership applications for approval by the board.
- General Manager Dan McNaull reviewed the petitions that had been filed for the 2023 trustee elections.
- Trustees nominated members for the Credentials Committee for the upcoming elections. Dan Schloemer appointed Dennis Rees; Gene Lamoreaux appointed Gary Hunter; Tom Lucha appointed Steve Gray; Bruce Leimbach appointed John Noss; Carl Ayers appointed Kevin Hahn; Kevin Reidy appointed Steve Willeke; Rob Turk appointed Steve Taylor; Elaine Oswald appointed Dave Seiss; and John Martin appointed Richard Murr. All nominations were accepted.
- The board reviewed an OEC Statistical Report issued in September 2022 and reported on how the cooperative compared to others in the state.
- McNaull advised the board of the upcoming NRECA Legislative Conference in Washington, D.C., which he and Director of Operations Don Englet would be attending.

- The board reviewed the cooperative's 2022 audit. BHM CPA Group, who conducted the audit, reported it was a clean audit and that no issues were found.
- Englet reviewed recent projects in the operations department, including the planned widening of a portion of State Route 545 by the Ohio Department of Transportation and the progress on AEP's construction of the new 69kV line in New London.
- The board discussed amounts for a potential retirement of capital credits.
- Director of Finance and Accounting Tabi Shepherd reviewed the February financials and reported on recent accounting and billing department activities.
- Director of Communications and Technology Andrea Gravenhorst reported on recent activities involving the member services and IT departments. McNaull commended Gravenhorst on a high score in the coop's recent assessment with the Rural Electric Cyber Advancement Program.
